We hope to run MPPS as a third sector and community hub, serving the charities, groups and folk of the Garioch.

The purpose of a third sector hub is like an old-fashioned community centre – space for people to come together, share information, learning and the facility.

Obviously we have some ideas for what that space will house... childcare, training venue, community space for groups to use, kitchen space, small business/social enterprise spaces and whatever you need us to provide!

There is a lot of work to be done between now and then... the initial paperwork for our request is with the council now. We will keep you all updated as the business plan progresses, and will ask for your input, support and advice as we need it.

Community resilience & supporting communities to plan

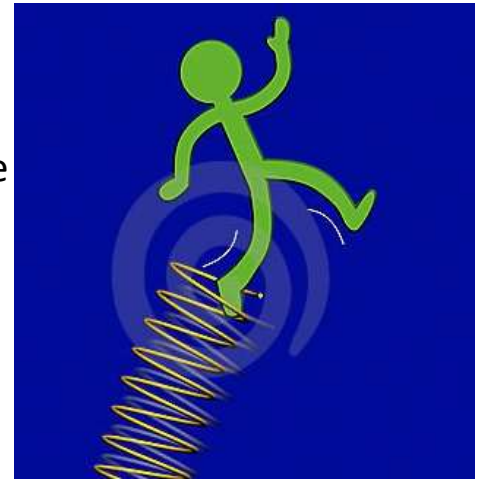
What do we mean by resilience?

The Oxford English Dictionary defines resilience as “rebounding or bouncing back”;

“elasticity: the power of resuming an original shape or position after compression, bending,”

and “the quality or fact of being able to recover quickly or easily from, or resist being affected by, a misfortune, shock, illness”

(Oxford English Dictionary, 2016)



So what is community resilience?



In brief...

“Community resilience is defined as the ability to recover and grow after unplanned events”

Within this definition, there is also the tension of “community” where we can lump everyone in together and underestimate the differences within the areas we live.

Community development and resilience?

What exactly is “community development”?

Garven, McLean and Pattoni define it as...



“Community development seeks to un-tap and mobilise the human capital, the skills, knowledge, experience and social and personal attributes possessed by individuals, which exist within every community, to create strong social and community networks.

It supports people to organise around the issues that affect them, their families and communities, and helps them implement locally led solutions using the whole range of assets they may have available to them (human, social, physical, cultural, political).”

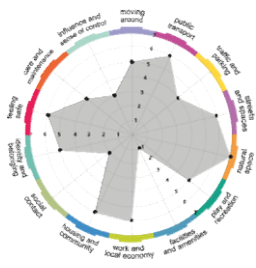

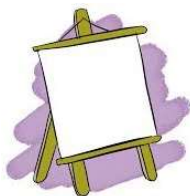

What do we help communities achieve?

EQUALITY VERSUS EQUITY



In the first image, it is assumed that everyone will benefit from the same supports. They are being treated equally.



In the second image, individuals are given different supports to make it possible for them to have equal access to the game. They are being treated equitably.



In the third image, all three can see the game without any supports or accommodations because the cause of the inequity was addressed. The systemic barrier has been removed.

How does this aid resilience?



“Many social groups, moreover, require partnership between public and private groups. Though government should not seek to replace local communities, it may need to empower them by strategies of support, including revenue-sharing and technical assistance”

Are you ready for Data Protection reform?

The Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) would like to advise Scottish charities that they need to prepare for the upcoming changes in data protection legislation.

From 25 May 2018, all organisations will have to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). Although the GDPR shares similarities with the existing UK Data Protection Act 1998 (DPA), it also has some new and different requirements.

Under GDPR, UK citizens will benefit from new or stronger rights:

- to be informed about how their data is used;
- around data portability across service providers;
- to erase or delete their personal information;
- over access to the personal data an organisation holds about them;
- to correct inaccurate or incomplete information; and
- over automated decisions and profiling.

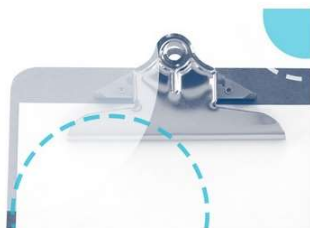
Scottish charities must be aware of all of their requirements and should prepare for the GDPR prior to its launch. They may need, for example, to put new procedures in place to deal with the GDPR's new transparency and individuals' rights provisions. In a large or complex organisation this could have significant budgetary, IT, personnel, governance and communications implications.

New getting ready for GDPR and CCTV checklists

We have added two new checklists to our data protection toolkit for SMEs. The first checklist can help organisations assess their progress in preparing for the GDPR and the other helps assess compliance when using CCTV.

To assist you, the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) website contains information on how you can prepare for the GDPR, including a guide which outlines 12 steps to take right now and self-assessment checklists to help you.

New personalised logo for Scottish Charities

The Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) is supporting Scottish charities publicise their charitable status by providing them with a personalised registration logo.



Everyone running a charity should be aware of the legal requirement to promote charitable status to the public.

This is set out in section 15 of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and explained in the guidance on our website:

To help charities do this in a clear and consistent way, OSCR has produced a charity registration logo that can be downloaded free of charge and used on a charity's website, email signatures and publications, including hard copy. Every logo contains an individual Scottish charity's number on it.

To download it, all a charity has to do is visit their entry in the Scottish Charity Register and click on the link next to 'OSCR Registration Logo'. We have also produced guidelines that explain how it should be used:

This updated logo replaces the one released in February 2016 - which was intended for electronic use only. The feedback showed that organisations wanted a logo that could be used on printed materials and contained their own charity number. This latest version comes in a variety of formats, so charitable status can be highlighted on a range of items.

Your Voice Your Choice



The winners of the Your Voice Your Choice awards were announced on Tuesday 27th June. Attendees were also treated to a fine feast provided by Fly Cup, as well as having the opportunity to network with other groups working in the Garioch area.

Groups were asked to submit bids for projects that would improve inclusion and tackle social isolation in Garioch; each group then designed a poster which were displayed at community events in towns including Kemnay, Inch and Inverurie.

Members of the public voted for their favourite projects with the most popular projects receiving a share of £35,000, funded by the Aberdeenshire Health and Social Care Partnership.

With over 2,700 votes cast throughout the Garioch area, the group who received the most votes were Gordon Riding for the Disabled.

Currently providing 17 sessions of equine therapy to 69 riders with disabilities each week, the funding will help pay for the day to day costs of two ponies.

Unfortunately, not every group who applied were successful. However, TGP are happy to support them with applications to other funders.

iPad and Tablet Classes



Two very successful iPad/Tablet Classes were held in Westhill Library run by Aberdeenshire Council's Leisure Learning, partnering with Libraries and iConnect North East.

These 6 week classes in January & February were open to all the community and taken up by a broad age range of participants from 50 years young to 97 year old!!! – YES 97 years old and hungry for continual learning she kept the Tutors on their toes!

Fully funded through a grant from 'The Garioch Partnership', each class was limited to 5 participants to provide quality time to help familiarise themselves with their digital device to browse the internet, contact their families and friends through email/social media, take photos and be able to access the free downloads from Aberdeenshire Libraries - eBooks, audio books, e-magazines, music and more.



The participants thoroughly enjoyed the course saying 'having a small group helped us ask questions and gave us confidence to try things that we wouldn't have. I am now so much more confident in using my iPad/Tablet – thank you so much.'

The course was also assisted by two volunteers Stephen Malcolm a Satellite Communications engineer and Agnieszka Walicka originally from Poland living locally and doing a Masters at RGU in Information and Library Studies.

Due to this success in Birmingham, Diamonds will now have seven gymnasts (a record number of participants for the club) competing in the British NDP Finals in Telford early July.

Wildlife warning



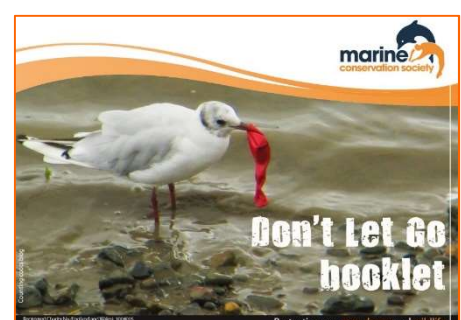
We have recently been made aware of an issue concerning mass balloon releases and also paper Chinese lanterns, which you may not be aware of.

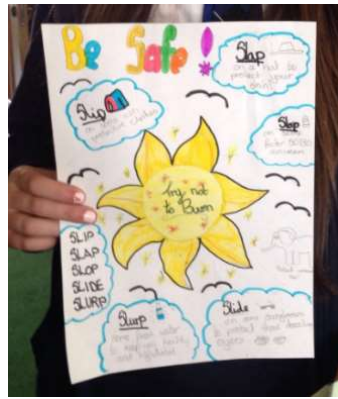
Releasing balloons in coastal areas (quite aside from the litter aspect), poses a threat to wildlife, in particular seals, dolphins and seabirds. Balloons that deflate over the sea can land in it and are then mistaken for jellyfish by dolphins and seals; the balloon twists in the animal's gut with the result that it slowly starves to death. Birds get

entangled in the ribbons and strings tied to the balloons. Cattle and farm animals can choke on balloons, strings and the wire from Chinese lanterns.

Aberdeenshire Council prohibits intentional balloon and lantern releases on council owned land and property, by council staff, and at events endorsed or supported by the council. The purpose of the project is to better educate young people on the importance of sun protection and the dangers of the sun. Melanoma, the most serious form of skin cancer, is now the most common cancer in under 35 year olds - so the need for better education and awareness has never been greater!

Our trained sun awareness teachers deliver free, fun and interactive lessons. Since launching the project in 2013 we have reached over 40,000 pupils in Scotland. We have expanded the project to cover Aberdeenshire and our talented teachers; Shona and Jordan, have reached over 2000 pupils this year alone, delivering an important message in time for the summer period –

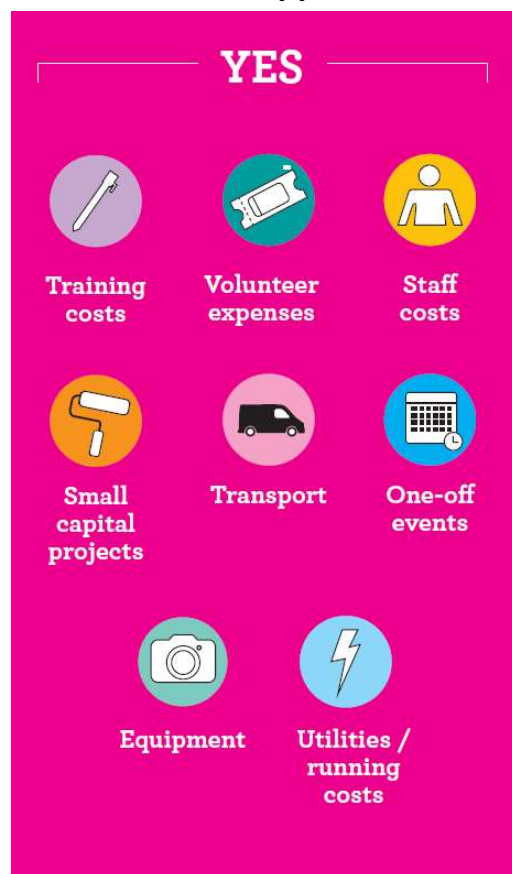
